**SPEECH OF
PRESIDENT RODRIGO ROA DUTERTE
DURING THE CELEBRATION OF THE 120-YEAR PRESENCE OF THE
BAPTIST CHURCHES IN THE PHILIPPINES**

[Delivered at the SMX Convention Center in Pasay City | 16 January 2020]

Thank you. Kindly sit down.

Senator Cynthia Villar; Senator Bong Go; Representative Bienvenido Abante Jr.; the BIBLEMODE International Secretary General Bishop Reuben Abante and the Alliance of Baptist Councils and Baptist Church Leaders in the Philippines; other distinguished guests; ladies and gentlemen.

I will read a prepared speech --- ah just two pages. *[laughter]* Not enough time for me to express personally what is in my heart. *[applause]* I would propose to read the written speech to give justice to the ladies or my staff who prepared this for after all, this is a toil of the --- for today's event.

I express my heartfelt congratulations to all the members of the Baptist Churches across the country for marking the 120th year of your ministry.

Today, I join you in thanksgiving for the success of the Church community's mission to spread God's message of love, hope and faith throughout the archipelago.

Indeed, the impact you have made within your respective ministries borne a fruitful Christian way of life among Filipinos.

Let me also acknowledge your significant contributions to society and your valuable efforts in maintaining lasting peace in the country.

By always seeking to express God's love in the pursuit of justice, righteous governance, progress and prosperity for all Filipinos, you have enabled our people to see fulfillment and purpose in your fellowship.

As we journey on the dynamic path towards nation-building, I trust that you will continue to join us in praying for good leaders who will embody Christian values and ideals in governance. *[applause]*

Rest assured that we in government are committed to upholding human dignity and welfare; and we look forward to the continued support of the Baptists of the Philippines in all endeavors. *[applause]*

I likewise hope and pray that you will remain a vibrant, inclusive and growing church community that is relentless in serving our people, especially those who are most in need.

May your enthusiasm in proclaiming the Good News of salvation not only touch our people's lives but also stir transformative change within them. *[applause]*

With the adversities we are facing both here and abroad, we are called, now more than ever, to stand together in faith, prayer and unity. *[applause]*

Let us therefore work with renewed fervor and hope in bringing forth a strong and progressive Philippines for the benefit of the next generations.

I will not read the --- well, 'yung pasalamat, but I have this to say.

I do not proclaim myself as the most righteous Filipino in this country. I'm not even saying that I am good. Maybe trying to be good. If faults are to be spoken, me, I have many faults, plenty along the way in my journey through life. Seventy-four years of existence have taught me almost everything that is only good for human beings.

I have this --- may I be allowed to drink? *[laughter and applause]*

Well, Alex is here. He is --- he heads the body, the entity that takes care of the intelligence community in the Philippines. He is a top honcho. And Banac is also a good police officer. *[applause]*

I'd like to thank you for being here with me. Alam --- you know I said, I may not be really the charging warrior in the governance of my country.

I said faults many but it had nothing to do --- the issue was never money. I've been mayor for 23 years in Davao and what I've learned is what I have learned from my father. And I was just as --- well, it would be a natural thing for me to follow what he preached to us as children. He was a

governor of Davao for 12 years when Davao was only one. There was no Davao Del Norte, Del Sur, Oriental, ComVal Valley, what they call now the Davao de Oro, Davao del Norte and Davao City. It was a huge place then.

And my father was just an ordinary man. He was a lawyer. But not a brilliant man but maybe a good one. That's why my standard in my dreams and even in ambitions is just to be good. Not very good but just good. But one thing I hate really in my work now is to see people who are corrupt. Most of the military men General Agudo --- Monteagudo was assigned in Davao at kayong mga taga-Davao you know that I said for all the faults that I have committed there was never an issue of money.

And so when I became President, I said --- many people who helped me --- that made me mayor in '88 and they were with me when I became President. They worked very hard during the mayorship campaigning and worked very, very hard during the campaign as president --- in the presidency. But when I won as you are --- we are wont to do Filipinos, we pay our debts.

Mahalaga sa atin `yan. That word, especially to the Visayan who says utang kabubut-on which translates utang na loob. Mabigat `yan sa Visaya. Among the Visayan tribe, we invoke that kind of narrative.

We are almost compelled to do what we can, how to repay it, but it must be a good one and it would not hurt other people. When I became President, I took most of them in --- some Cabinet members, others big positions. That is always the politics in the Philippines.

But along the way, I have fired about four Cabinet members who were good and one of them was even my brod in the fraternity school. So it grieves me really to see them go. But I said this is something which cannot be compromised.

You know, government is not our own hacienda. It is not a private property owned by anybody. And all that we are now is --- would just be a passing scene in the lives of our people and to yourself.

So I've been very strict. I just fired the lawyer of PNOC, the oil company and the guy who was handling exploration. He made a contract which I could not agree to its --- and so I fired him. And I --- well I just appointed... I was looking for one and Briguez --- General Briguez who headed the Air Force was the choice. He was a good man. He had a very structural mind. He's a graduate of PMA.

And for the years that I've been mayor, he was working --- he was building his career. I was watching him and I said, well someday I could make use of the talent of this man. So I appointed him the --- in a very sensitive exploration office of the PNOC.

I still have one important message to you. I am supposed to end my term in about a few months from now. But there was this incident where I was in Davao and I have been reading and hearing the news about no water in Manila, both east and west.

And so I was making calls and somebody told me in strict confidence that it is not true that there's no water. There was no water for two weeks. People were scrambling to get a few drops.

And when I was informed that there was water, I really lost my patience. I -- you know my mouth for cuss words. But I said I --- we will be flying tomorrow there in Manila, if I do not see water flowing from the faucets from everywhere, I'm going to line you up and slap each and every one of you. *[laughter and applause]*

And you must know that I was doing it almost every day in Davao when I was mayor trying to discipline a city. And you can go to Davao now and see for yourself. It's good. It's clean. People are behaved, very courteous. Not because they feared somebody but because all the 23 years I was instilling discipline and all other good things that come in a man's life.

And Davao city now, *[applause]* it is the most viable and still today number one in investments and Davao was a local business going on, very vibrant. I've been able to raise a sizeable number of people. And what --- that is really what I'm going for to up the middle class --- to push it up. So that's how I did it.

But here in Manila because of that water ruckus, I began to play in my gray matter between the ears. Sabi ko, why is this like this?

And so I'm telling you now that you know the imponderables of life. If I do not make it to the finish line, this is really my message to each and every Filipino.

You know, all those times, many years and even during my time, you're always looking for the big fish, the corrupt people. And they would say, "Who gets prosecuted?" "The poor guy." "Who gets arrested?" Well, one of no consequence at all or arresting the wrong persons.

Well you know, how hard it is. I've been a prosecutor. That was what I was when I was run --- when I ran for the mayorship before being an OIC for one year. In all of my life, I was a prosecuting --- cases in court.

And so there was this statement of --- statement that ordered my --- our government to pay 7 million dollars. And previously I was informed that we paid 3 million. I said, what is this? And it turned out that in a contract, if the distributors of water, concessionaires, they distribute water. Ayala on the west, Pangilinan on the west or baka magkabaliktad lang.

But still in that contract which was hidden from the Filipinos in 1997, there was this provision kuno allegedly that I have to pay them for the losses that they incurred while waiting for the approval of the price increase --- not the price --- the rates of water.

And so in the meantime that the regulator, MWSS, were pondering on it, looking at it, the every day that they would lose in millions were added to the bill that we are supposed to pay.

In other words, we pay for their losses. And so when the bill was submitted to me, I said, you know what is this s***? Tell them... I said... *[laughter and applause]* Tell --- there's no f***** payment coming their way. *[applause]*

And so I began to scrutinize the contract. And Harry is here. He'll be one of the lawyers who'd be --- they would be facing maybe in court because in the contract, they were the ones --- the concessionaires, 'yung distributors were allowed --- were the very --- the entity only allowed to authorize to increase the rates. Without the participation of any government entity, except the regulator, which was really --- which is or was or the office inutile. Ganun talaga. It was inutility and... *[laughter and applause]*

I am saying this, I said, because if I do not reach the finish line for one reason or another, the li --- the imponder... After this, I am flying home. I have to see my family. Do not forget this case kasi dito, it's the blood of the Filipino, the sweat of the Filipino that made them very, very rich. *[applause]*

Another provision is that the corporate income tax. They were allowed to pass it on to the consumers. Kaya talaga ako p***** i**... *[cheers and applause]*

You know, when I say epithets and cuss words, they have really a meaning. Talagang galit ako sa --- you... *[cheers and applause]*

Sabi ko nga eh kung nakakaharap ko lang kayo, pinagsasampal ko na kayo. *[laughter]* And I really do it. To this day, nangbubugbog talaga ako ng tao.

I will not tell you, but plenty. Lahat, all wrongdoings that would catch my attention that has a significance, I call them. I ask the PSG. And if you are really fond of extorting and you love money... One time I said, I don't carry money except the handkerchief and the Valda Pastilles. *[laughter]* And the one that I was eating when my name was called, this time to talk. *[laughter]*

Ang isa pa doon na `di ko --- `yung --- the term of the contract is 2037. And in that contract executed in 1997, meron doon in your bills tingnan ninyo. There is there an expense which says --- pinaganda lang nila, make it a more highfalutin thing: "environmental enhancement." And we were paying --- I don't know, you might want to... I do not pay the bills, it's my wife.

And I --- in my house there in --- across the... I stay in the camp of the --- near the camp of the military. I do not stay there in that house. It gives me the --- not really... Hindi naman ako natatakot. You know if you believe in God you are not up to this... *[cheers and applause]*

Kasi ako natulog ako minsan doon sabi ko, "P***** i**," *[laughter]* huwag mo akong istorbohin dito kay marami akong problema. P***** i**," sipain talaga kita." *[laughter]*

And if you are a girl ghost, well, if it is to my liking, I will just embrace a ghost and... *[laughter]* I know the difference between a real ghost and a real woman. *[laughter]*

So `yun ang ano. They have been collecting water treatment by way of sabi nila "environmental enhancement". Since 1957 nasa bill na natin `yan. Hanggang ngayon kay ilagay daw nila diyan sa Harrison, they're going to build a water treatment facility before bitawan mo sa Pasig. Until now wala.

So they have been collecting money from the people. Almost trillions na `yan by now. If that is not plunder, what is it? If it is not large estafa, fraud, then what is it? Kaya ito huwag ninyong bitawan kung sakali hindi talaga ako aabot, if I'm not around anymore. Do not forget this. Kasi tina... Every time, anytime they would always --- itong mga opposition --- "So where's the big fish? Bakit maliit lang?" With all the sarcasm. Oh ito. Ibinigay ko na sa inyo. P***** i**, mas malaki pa sa... *[laughter and applause]*

Ito na. Ito na. Ayala, Pangilinan. That's why I've been telling you in the campaign corruption. What's happening down in the Customs and BIR is just pittance. The big corruptions are the families, the ruling elite since the Spaniards. Sila `yun when they were awarded so many tract of lands. `Yang Bacolod pati `yang... You know the feudal system. And until now is really very almost vicious.

`Yung may sugar plantations because that's were the large tracts of lands given by the Spanish government to the selected and rich people. The favored ones. The Insulares. The Spaniards who never went back or who were born here. They're called the Insulares. Sila `yan ang... So ganun ang dito.

And I could not --- to you lawyers --- I could not in my --- I could not just fathom bakit ginawa nila `yan sa Pilipino. Kasi `yung con --- if the... If you have a copy of the contract and a copy of the Anti-Graft Law and you put it side by side, all the provisions, the prohibited acts in the Anti-Graft law is there in the contract itself.

So how come the lawyers of this republic allowed it to happen? And that is why I said --- they said, "Duterte is always ranting." Yes, true because I --- it gives me a nightmare kung bakit, why this thing happened to the Filipino.

So do not let go of this contract. I have a choice. I have a contract that was prepared, a draft and submitted to them by this time. If they do not agree to it, fine. Okay. I will take over and nationalize the water resources of the Philippines. *[applause]*

You do not accept it, I take over and I will charge you in court. If you accept it, fine but there is no guarantee. I cannot --- I could never... I said there are so many millions of Filipinos. One might just decide to bring a case against you. 'Yan ang hindi ko mapigilan. Tanggapin ninyo, then maybe we have a compromise.

But then I would have to address to the nation, Duterte there is or there was --- or there is --- or was and is a continuing crime until now, why are you not prosecuting them? We thought that you are a fiscal. So what gives? So that's my dilemma.

Even if we renew the contract, there's always the duty of the executive department especially the President to see to it that crimes are prosecuted. So 'yan ang problema nila. Hindi nila pirmahan, mag-take over ako, I'll charge them myself. Kung pirmahan nila, maybe I will just --- you know, I'll take it over.

But there is no guarantee that I will not or anybody, any Filipino for that matter would decide to file a case against them. But whatever it is, please keep track of the contract.

I have prepared one that has been submitted to them. Pero ako, it is a long process. I... I am... I'll be out in a few months. Please do not abandon this case because I said if you are looking for the biggest --- it's really people who take advantage of their wealth and position.

Sila 'yan eh --- those tracts of lands. Makati used to be a swampy land. They bought it or given it to them for free. Same with the doughnut and the Prietos. 'Yung Mile Long diyan, they built commercial centers there without paying the government any single centavo for so many years because of their connection.

Huwag ninyong bitawan 'yan kasi dugo ng Pilipino talaga 'yan. Huwag ninyong bitawan 'yan. Kung wala na ako, bahala na kayo. *[applause]*

So those are the things that I have to tell you. I came here to exactly inform you of the state of... But all others, you can relax.

In --- for our visitors, I see that you had a problem with the immigration. We cannot simply accommodate that number in just a jiffy. I need... There's a lack of government guys who can receive the incoming especially if the planes from different countries would arrive almost simultaneously.

In... If you go to NAIA or the Manila International Airport, every two minutes may take off, may landing. That is how hard that --- how hard-pressed are we in dealing with this. Pero ngayon, i-ano man --- you use the electronic.

If you go abroad, no need for the immigration. They are just there just to get the number and give --- they will give --- you have passport and just swipe and that's all there is to it.

Until now, I prohibit the Customs from opening bags. Maybe for a reason but generally I do not allow the inspection of bags anymore. Just like in Hong Kong, any other countries... *[applause]*

Anyway, if I... You try to --- if you split away drugs, I will --- I will catch you. And I... I really do not know what I will do with you. The law enforcement is clear. They can arrest and they can prosecute.

But me, if I'm the one there, well there is always heaven and there is always hell. Make your choice. *[cheers and applause]* I... You know... I'm talking about religion. I am not really up to it now.

I'm sorry to tell you this because... Well, I was studying in Ateneo High School. Dominguez, he was the brightest. Until now, he's the Finance Secretary. And he's rich because he is bright. He owns Marco Polo. The brothers...

Me, I finished high school in 7 years. So medyo I'm not... I've never been an extraordinary. I'm just almost the ordinary man on the street. So it's always 75. Since Grade 1, 75, 75. Until law school, it's 75.

And my mother used to say... She was a teacher. "Rodrigo, what is this? Is there no... Is there no improvement that we can expect?" I said, "Ma, if I

get 75, I go to the next grade. If I get 95, the same. I will... So why do..." *[laughter and applause]*

Why do I have to study extra hours when a 75 would get you everywhere? *[laughter]* And true enough, yes. And even in college. Instead of --- sometimes, you know, studying and suddenly the urge comes and your idiot bro --- fraternity brothers would look at you and say... So we decided to go down Legarda, Mendiola, in that corner. It's still there: "Chilled beer". That is where we spent our time studying. *[laughter]* The art of drinking.

Well, when I became President, I can really say that the presidency is a gift from God. *[applause]* Why it's given to you? You know, I was not given a Chinaman's chance to win the elections. Maski kayo alam ninyo. Well, somebody... Baka.

I was always number four in the ratings. So nobody give... I said mahirap. But I just campaigned and went to the provinces with the limited money.

And I had breakfast then with the Reverend Abante once and he told me na, "Go on. You might make it." And so --- so suddenly... I'm always number 4. I never got to be number 3, number 2, or number 1. But about three weeks before the election, I shot up to 32 and Grace remained stagnant, the highest next to me was 27.

So that was the time I told my wife that if God wills it, I might make it to Malacañan. *[applause]* And so I'm here with you. I am not delivering a speech, I am just talking to you.

So when I became President, I said I got the best. But you know, the best sometimes... But most of them are really brilliant. Sonny is --- was... Since kindergarten to high school, he was the valedictorian.

So Delfin Lorenzana is a valedictorian. And so is... Almost all of them are bright. Tugade was our valedictorian in the law school. So when we get to sit in the Cabinet, including Arthur, I see powerful men, powerful speeches, and knowledge.

And I was look --- trying to look at them and say all of them are really brilliant and even the military men. All of them were --- had a cum laude. Me? I got the cum-cum. No laude. *[laughter]*

So I look around and see the brilliant men and me and I would hear them talk. And the thought would strike me. You know, how in the earth a 75 could prevail over the valedictorians? *[applause]*

Briones who is the Treasury chief. She is a brilliant woman. Even at her age, when she talks in the Cabinet, everybody listens. Berna, DOT, is also a magna cum laude. Almost all of them. But when the 75 talks, *[laughter]* they listen. *[cheers and applause]*

And when I say, "You, general, you do this. You clean Boracay. *[laughter]* I will give you six months." And true enough... That's why do not misconstrue me. The... My... My choice of military men has nothing to do with anything at all about --- hindi ako nagpapalakas. I'm not here to ingratiate myself to them.

I won the election. People voted for me not the military or police. But I like the way they behave, especially the bright ones.

Pagka sinabi mo "you do this," and they will do it. I told the Año and Cimatú, "do it in six months." And they did. And everything... Now the problem now with the...

You must know Manila Bay could never be improved by Cimatú. All he can do is to reduce the contamination. Why? Because there is no water treatment.

Until now, all the wastewater are blown every day to the Manila Bay. And that job was supposed to be done by this --- the one who got the contract of water sewer and sewerage, which is the two companies. Now, they are having sleepless nights. You would notice that you can hardly hear a whimper from them.

And every time there --- and even Ayala would write the unthinkable of writing an apology and signing it. I have nothing against you personally, but you have to explain to the Filipino people why you did it. *[applause]* 'Yan ang ano ko. Just tell the Filipino bakit mo ginawa 'tong p***** i***** 'to? *[laughter]*

So that's what pisses me off. Why? Because the violations I said contained in the Anti-Graft and Corrupt Practices are all there. And so the lawyers of government and everybody is trying to be a minimalist. They're trying to explain their role as minimal. But I said even if we renew the contract or not, the people should know kung sino 'yung mga Pilipino and I will reveal all of them.

I'm just trying to finish the --- I will reveal who are they so that you can ask them, including the Ayala and Pangilinan na bakit mo ginawa sa amin 'yan? *[applause]*

Bigyan mo ako ng sagot. P***** i** 'pag hindi, babarilin ko 'yang bayag mo p***** i** ka. *[laughter]*

Pardon my --- that's what I am. And to end I said I am not even with quarrel with my with... You know even in high school, Ateneo, I'd like you to know that we were really molested. All of us. You look into your internet, go to Harvey --- Harvey Falvey or Paul Falvey. She's the --- he's the priest who was charged in LA, and the parish had to compromise shelling out 25 million dollars.

He was doing it to us. You know what? Not really big but you know when you are from --- you study in Ateneo, meron dito, 'di ba Friday, it's Friday it's always communion. And there's always a mass and communion is mandatory. Now, while we were confessing our sins, he was also groping us there down. And --- I'm telling you now, I'm telling you as a government worker, totoo 'yan.

So from there on ma --- wala ako. So what I did was... You know About Ben Adhem? You must know that --- you know there's a --- in high school there

is a poem About Ben Adhem. He awoke one night in a blinding flash of light, and an apparition of an angel she saw.

And tinanong --- he asked the angel, "What brought thy presence here?" No... The angel said, "I'm just visiting you." And About Ben Adhem said, "What's it --- what's that tablet that you are carrying?" And the angel replied to About Ben Adhem. "This are --- this is a list of the men who love God." Sabi About Ben Adhem said, "Is my --- is my name in that list?" And the angel looked at the list and said, "No, your name is not here."

And he said, "Do you have a list of those who love their fellowmen?" And the angel said, "No, we have only one list. Sorry." And so when the angel disappeared, About Ben Adhem was a little bit sad that his name was not in the list of those who love God.

When the following night, again the angel appeared before About Ben Adhem. And he awoke startled with the brilliant light and he saw the angle again. And the angel said, "Why the hast come to us?" The angel said, "The truth you want." And, "You still have the list?" "Yes." "About those who love God?" "Yes." "Maybe you can add me even in the last."

And the angel said, "Nay. You look at the list, Abou." And he looked at it. He was number one those who love God. And said, "My name is there." "Yes. You are now in the list of those who love truly God." And he said, "Well, I will just continue to serve my fellowmen for after all, it's the same." *[applause]*

So that's what I am. If these idiot bishops here. They are. I do not hide my contempt. They are a bunch of... You know, I --- I --- it's very hard to secure a copy. But if you get one, read it. The Popes. Plural. Read it and you will puke. There's that chapter there where a pope had an incestuous relation with their daughter, and they programmed the son to become a pope. And actually, he became a pope.

And that is how --- by that alone I have --- you know, I have lost my --- well, everything. So when we quarreled openly, I b**s***ted them. P*****

i** kayong mga... And I'm --- I think I'm the first politician who spoke against the church. *[applause]*

And you know what? He said okay --- he said... And there was a time during the campaign --- this is the last --- it's not a joke but it's an episode of my life.

You know, I was a --- scheduled to be proclaimed in Century --- Century Park. I got out of the hotel, a holiday, I forgot to you know relieve myself.

When the car came, I just rode on it and it took me almost four hours to negotiate because they were all closing the streets because the Pope was here.

So the urge to relieve since I could not do it outside, I said --- I just told the security that you know, I have to do it here, you just clean it up. *[laughter]* Talagang naiihi na ako --- puputok na 'yung ano ko eh. Sabi ko, "dito na lang."

So when I arrived, so they were almost clapping a sigh of relief, "hay, dumating talaga." And the ladies... And when I began my speech, I said, "I'm late because, you know, all of the streets ---Dewey Boulevard was closed. Eh p***** i**** Pope na ito, ayaw pang umuwi eh." *[laughter]*

T***** i** itong Pope na ito. And well [Arya Domingo?] one of them with the other ladies said, she's my supporter, "Wala na, Mayor. Talo na tayo. Bakit mo naman p*****i**** si Pope?"

Eh sabi ko, "naiihi ako tapos limang oras ako hanggang dumating dito." Kaya sabi ko --- kaya no way that I will cross --- close the cross streets and the boulevard. Sabi ko, "Ayaw ko. Huwag ninyong gawaing --- basta abli na lang 'yan." You know, one lane will do or you can have the security, the hagads but no closing of...

Wala talaga. Sa panahon ko. No --- no closing of the... One lane, maybe. Pero wala 'yung sara-sara.

So hindi ako maniwala na ano. Because after that, sinabi ko, "p*****j*** Pope na ito, ayaw pang umuwi." *[laughter]*

Then when the results of the election came, I got seven --- 6 million over the next. And so, maybe --- maybe it's good to b***s*** the bishops. *[laughter]* It might make you win. *[laughter]*

Take it from my experience, until now. *[laughter]* But they have.... I cannot tell you why but they are now ordered to... There's an... I cannot --- it's supposed to be in confidential. Pero you'd notice they are no longer complaining. Even if you say b***s***, they don't respond anymore. *[laughter]* That is --- that is how to win the war against the Catholic Church. *[laughter and applause]* All you have to say, "p*****j*** ninyo." Panalo ka na. *[laughter]*

Well anyway, I have taken much of your time, ladies and gentlemen. I'm very happy. I'm very happy that I am here because I.... *[applause]*

Me, I have this deep and abiding faith in God. *[applause]* You see me in Jolo, you see me in going to war in Marawi. Well, it's not about bravery. It's about faith in God. *[cheers and applause]*

And one of my helicopters got hit because I stayed there until nighttime and I fly. So it's very... One of my choppers got a hole in the...

But then I said, you know, I've always said this universal thing, it's controlled --- it cannot be possible without God. *[cheers and applause]*

If you watched the billions and millions and billion of stars, even how big the space is, the fact that we survived almost 5 --- 4.5 billion years, God must have said that his creation must be there.

Five --- almost 5 billion, and nothing happened except for the small craters in Siberia and Yucatan, I think. That is all.

I hope that some little meteorites will hit all the bishops in the head. *[laughter]* Something is wrong with them. *[laughter]* Because they started to fight and they told me that I am a heretic. Why should...?

You know when I criticize you, I do not become heretic. That is... We are not in the medieval times god**** it. I will...
